The Mountain Garden Club raises funds for community service efforts

The gorgeous flowers at the Conway traffic islands welcome locals and visitors alike to the Valley. A small green sign on one island notes, “Planted and maintained by the Mountain Garden Club.” While one of the most visible club endeavors, the traffic islands represent only one part of what the MGC contributes to the valley community.

Fundraising events are held throughout the year to answer two primary needs. First, funds provide scholarships for qualified area students to continue their education in the environmental or horticultural fields. The Alice T. Madden Memorial Scholarships are awarded yearly to graduating high school seniors and post-secondary students from the Mount Washington Valley studying plant science disciplines such as Horticulture, Agriculture, Forestry, Environmental Science, Land Management and other related “green” fields. The scholarships honor the memory of a past MGC president, Alice T. Madden, an original member of the Club, which was established in 1973.
